t is always intriguing and sometimes surprising to photograph interior designers in their own homes. If that home is in the city, it may well be a combination of showcase and fashion statement; but when Kate Earle opens the doors of her imposing, red-brick and stone Suffolk country house, there is no shock in store. 'While my taste has become a lot more modern, this is very much a country house and a family home,' she explains. 'I wanted to respect the architecture, the location and our lifestyle here.'

Kate – who began her decorating career at 17 – and her business partner Emily Todhunter together own Todhunter Earle Interiors, one of London's most successful interiors businesses. Often described as the creators of 'quiet glamour' and 'timeless modern comfort', they have set a benchmark that others follow. Signs of that quiet glamour can be found throughout this traditional and supremely comfortable house.

Once owned by the Tollemache family, it has evolved in three stages. It started out as a smallish Georgian house, built about 1780. In the 1890s, Frank Brown of Ipswich – a pupil of George Street, who designed the Royal Courts of Justice in the Strand – carried out a major expansion and added a pair of circular twin towers to the front. Lesser interior adjustments to the staircase hall were later undertaken to suit the prevailing Edwardian taste for a more openplan reception space.

Kate and her husband, barrister Tom Hill – who had bought the house before they were

elegant Gillows bookcases bought at Christie's. Painted 'Ball Green' from Farrow & Ball, the room is also used as a sitting room.

To the right of the staircase is a further sitting area, or saloon, lit by deep bay windows with armorial glass. A pair of old wing chairs are upholstered in a 'Groundworks' fabric from G P & J Baker, and the curtains are 'Zebra' by Neisha Crosland. Beyond this cosy space is an empty, ballroom-size drawing room facing east towards the ha-ha and boundary 'walls' of mature, topiary yew hedging. 'I am working on plans to restore this amazing room,' says Kate. 'The space above it will be our new bedroom suite.'

A corridor behind the dining room leads to the children's playroom and Kate's pretty office and sitting room. Opposite, she opened up several small rooms to create a large, glossy white kitchen and dining area, keeping the Fifties Aga and black-and-cream tiles, as well as a wall of beautifully made Thirties, glazed pantry cupboards. A square, limed-oak table and chairs by Philippe Hurel face the picket-fenced garden at the rear, which is reached via a new set of french windows. Typically, there are utility rooms and pantries, plus a lovely, old-fashioned cloak- and boot room behind the hall.

The principal bedrooms lead off the broad first-floor landing. Kate and Tom's four-poster bed is dressed in Todhunter Earle silks, while the leafy wallpaper and matching curtain fabric is 'Victoire', also by Todhunter Earle. 'Most of the furniture in our-bedroom was bought at the Ickworth sale in 1996,' Kate says. She describes her bathroom as previously having looked like an abattoir – 'Imagine peachy pink tiles and black vinyl.' Now lined with Cole & Son's 'Humming Birds' wallpaper, with fittings from Sitting Pretty Bathrooms, it is a classic, pampering space.

The spare room, with its wonderful views, is inspired by Nancy Lancaster's white bedroom at Kelmarsh—'She had a real zebra skin, while this is printed cowhide,' says Kate, referring to the rug. With shimmering wallpaper, a painted French bed, and silk eiderdown, pillows and hangings, this room is the epitome of that famed 'quiet glamour'. The curtains are made of organic linen, part of a range of textiles developed by Emily and Kate with O Ecotextiles and launched last September. In what is known as the children's wing is a further spare room, with walls covered in Cole & Son's 'Madras Violet', and beds dressed in antique paisley eiderdowns and checked blankets.

With both their families close by, a beach hut at Felixstowe, sailing trips off the Shotley peninsula and holidays on the beaches of Norfolk, you can understand why Kate and Tom relish their weekends in the country. 'We see our old friends and our children meet their children,' says Kate. 'We both love our work, and with a base in London, we truly have the best of both worlds.' Nobody could argue with that □
